Dr Ishrat-ul-Ebad Khan, Governor of Sindh and Patron of Greenwich University, on the occasion of the Convocation 2004.

Dr Abdul Sattar Edhi



WITH over fifty years of service to humanity to his credit, Maulana Abdul Sattar Edhi has become a legend in his life-time. Todate, more than 300 Edhi Centers, dotted all over the country, provide emergency services to the ailing humanity round the clock. According to the Guinness Book of Records 2000, Edhi Centre is "the largest voluntary ambulance organization of the world".

mention of illegitimate births, Edhi Homes have given a new lease of life to all such unwanted babies. The innovative concept of “Jhoolas” (Cradles) was indeed a brave, even defiant attempt to give life to the unwanted babies. Edhi Homes have also been providing shelter to the orphans, the widows, and even the social outcasts, such as the drug addicts. Edhi Homes, according to a modest estimate, provide shelter for more than 6,000 destitute, while the Edhi dispensaries and hospitals provide treatment to over one million patients annually, absolutely free of cost.

Edhi International Foundation with its branches in USA, England, Japan, UAE and Canada, are engaged in humanitarian work, supporting especially people belonging to the Third World.

Prof Masood Hameed Khan started his career in Medical Education in 1982, when he joined Chandka Medical College, Larkana, as an Assistant Professor. He was promoted as Associate Professor in 1989, and as Professor in March 1996.

In addition to being the editor of “The Journal of College of Physicians and Surgeons of Pakistan”, and “The Journal of Anaesthesiology”, he is also on the International Advisory Board of “Medicine International”.

Prof Dr Masood Hameed Khan has also authored books on various aspects of Medicine, including Applied Electrocardiography, and Manual for Diabetes.

He has trained 54 FCPS students at Dow Medical College and Jinnah Hospital Karachi.

Prof Dr Masood Hameed Khan is an educationist with a vision: he is determined to bring about a revolutionary change in Pakistan’s health – care system.

“The Best University Teacher” in the year 2000. He is a member of The International Shakespeare Association and the Founding President of the Shakespeare Association of Pakistan.

Prof Rafat Karim was elected to the Executive Committee of the Australia and New Zealand Shakespeare Association at Adelaide in 1992. This is a unique honour for Pakistan, as Prof Rafat Karim is the first, and so far the only, Shakespearean scholar from Asia, to be appointed to this prestigiously body.

In April 2001, Prof Rafat Karim was appointed to the distinguished panel of “The Shakespeare Quarterly” which is published by the Folger Shakespeare Library, Washington D.C. Prof Rafat Karim is the first Pakistani scholar to be appointed to this prestigious Committee.


In 1997, he organized an international conference on Shakespeare in Karachi – the first ever in the history of Pakistan.


