

Concluding with a quote, "There is no finish line. It's a continuous journey and I'm always looking to push my limits"




Socio Cultural Educational Tour Mauritius and Dubai

Pakistan Food Festival:

The aim of hosting such big event in a foreign country was not only to further strengthen the ties between Pakistan and Mauritius Government but also to extend hand of friendship, love and care between the two nations. The vital reason as to why Greenwich University also encouraged Pakistani students delegate to visit the beautiful country - Mauritius.

Moreover, the event was promising enough to promote trade and further strengthen economic ties between the countries.

The Pakistan Food Festival was also labeled as pre-Diwali celebration arranging mehndi for ladies and children, Jewelry stalls, face paintings, kids' corner, jumping castle and much more. What more could an individual look for celebration before a festive season.

The purpose behind organizing food festival just before





Diwali was to ease tension between the two countries Pakistan and India and to spread the message of love, peace and harmony.

Mauritians were introduced to scrumptious delicacies holding assorted flavors of Pakistani food made by Greenwich University's in-house chief specially flown in from Pakistan.

The event was inaugurated on October 20, 2016 by the Chancellor, Greenwich University, Ms. Seema Mughal and honorable dignitaries of Mauritius during a small





opening ceremony.

Among the Pakistani delegation present were the members of Trade Development Authority of Pakistan and Pakistani Businessman who had specially arrived to celebrate this Friendship Week to boost trade amongst the two countries.

The guests were introduced to a variety of delicious food option The guests tried all the options offered and the appreciation was overwhelming. Most of the invitees went for second and despite their inflamed pallets from all the flavor and spice from the sub-continent, they doused their pallets with the cold refreshments also being offered adding in the enjoyment of the food. Mauritian cuisine despite having its roots from the subcontinent had modified its connection with rich spice and flavor which was revived during the food festival.

The menu on the first day consisted of delicious Haleem, Biryani, Kabab, Mint Chatni, Allo-ka-bugia, Channa Chaat, Paratha, Halwa Puri, Allu-Samosa, Chicken Samosa, Spring rolls, Chicken Pakora and Mixed Pakoras followed by Kheer, Gulab Jaman, Zarda and Jalaibi for dessert.

After the inauguration, the festival was open to the public which brought in a sea of people flooding the hall and surpassing the expectations of the organizers. The queue stretched well outside the main enclosure where the main food stall was setup. Those waiting in the queue helped themselves to some of the smaller stalls where they indulged in appetizers such as Pani Puri, Gola-ganda and Kulfi before they got to their main course that awaited them inside.

The students of Greenwich University took it upon themselves to co-host the event along with the University faculty. The student's interaction with the Delegation and Dignitaries allowed them to build relations with the esteemed guests.

Mr. Shafqat was given a tour of the University Campus by Mrs. Mughal and the aim along with the vision of Greenwich University in Mauritius.

After the orientation, he was taken to the food stall where his nostalgia for home cooked food was addressed. He helped himself to some Biryani, Tikka, Kabab and chicken roll.

Now, Pakistani designers are known in international

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

Muneer, the Chief Executive, Trade Development Authority of Pakistan (TDAP), Mr. Sardar Yaseen Malik, a renowned Pakistani industrialist and philanthropist, and other officials and dignitaries from Pakistan and Mauritius.

It was a show of Pakistan's musical strength and diversity — ranging from our very own classical approach to the one having a modern and innovative touch of the present era. As the eminent singer broke the audience's chatters by singing one of his most famous and ever-green songs, Mitwa, from the 2006 Bollywood film Kabhi Alvida Na Kehna, it was if the people present in the hall had been taken to a virtual





trip to the eastern traditions of music and melody.

As soon as the scion of Patiala family set the momentum, it was a musical ride that never came to a halt, accelerating with every new song and introducing the people of Mauritius to what the people of Pakistan take as one of their prominent prides — our way of exporting love and peace via a wide range unique musical compositions and rich poetic expressions.

Let it be Tere Nena, from My Name Is Khan, Shukria Zindagi, from Aashayein, Bin Tere, from I Hate Love Stories, a big round of applause erupted in the hall after every single performance of the eminent artist.

To make the show more interactive and lively, the heart-throb singer came down the stage and walked through the audience. It was indeed memorable and special night for all of those who got a chance to speak their heart out by singing a few lines with the renowned singer. It was a time to strengthen the belief that music is the universal language of peace and love — a language that does not any discrimination on the basis of man-made boundaries, cast, creed, color or any other man-made divisions.

Shafqat Amanat Ali Khan also received several requests from the audience for singing different Pakistani and Indian songs but when he was requested to sing veteran poet Ibne Insha's most famous ghazal, Insha Jee Utho Ab Kooch Karo, the singer took a deep breath and spoke his heart out.

The singer said that he was often requested by his fans to sing the ghazal, but his family had asked him to decline any such request as his father, Ustad Amanat Ali Khan, passed away in 1974 after the ghazal was on aired on the Pakistan Television Corporation. He added that in 1778 the ghazal was once again aired on PTV and the poet, Ibne Insha, died a few months later. In 2006, he added, his brother, Asad Amant Ali Khan, rounded off a music show for PTV with singing the same ghazal and, unfortunately, it proved his last concert as his brother died the same year. Shafqat Amanat Ali Khan said the



ghazal had been termed as a cursed song and its poet had also said the same during his last days in London for medical treatment. The scion of Patiala family, however, sang only the first stanza of the ghazal to please his audience.

When the concert was about to end, Shafqat Amanat Ali Khan introduced all the members of his team, including two of his nephews who were performing as vocalists on the stage. 
Dinner with General Pervaiz Musharraf, Former President, Pakistan

Richard Geary Horwitz is the founder and Executive Director of Family Educational Services Foundation (FESF), a non-profit educational foundation operating in Pakistan since 1984. See: http://www.fesf.org.pk

He has worked in the field of Social Development for 44 years, managing personnel and services in non-profits in over 10 different countries throughout Asia, Europe and America. His work with people from diverse backgrounds and cultures has given him a wealth of training and experience in human resource development. Under his leadership, FESF has initiated The Deaf Reach Program - with six Deaf Reach Schools and Training Centers providing education and skills training to deaf children and young adults in Pakistan.

Greenwich University (GU): What was the idea behind the establishment of Family Educational Services Foundation (FESF)?

Richard Geary (RG): FESF came together organically through a group of like-minded individuals working here in Pakistan. All of us met up shortly after I first arrived here - close to 30 years ago. We were conducting informal programs in existing organizations: working with children that were handicapped, conducting teacher training programs, and similar educational projects. We felt that we could get more accomplished if we formalized our goals and relationships.

(GU): Many may not be aware of your organization. Please tell us something about FESF's activities.

FESF is doing some fantastic work in the education sector. Our overarching goal is to reach out to and empower

the disadvantaged in the community and improve the quality of their lives. We do this through our Deaf Reach Program and our Eduserve projects.

Deaf Reach is the only branch network of schools for the Deaf in Pakistan...and one that particularly reaches out into the rural areas of the interior. 50% of our more than 150 teaching staff are deaf themselves. As we are targeting disadvantaged children and their families, our education and training programs are basically free of cost. We provide pick and drop transportation, uniforms, books, school materials, lunch and much more.

We provide state-of-the-art facilities at six schools in Karachi, Hyderabad, Sukkur, Nawabshah, Tando Allahyar & Lahore. Over 5,000 Deaf students have passed through the Deaf Reach system, with 1,400 deaf children presently attending daily classes. Each deaf student ultimately becomes literate in three languages: Pakistan Sign Language

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(PSL), English & Urdu.

Deaf Reach College, Karachi, is now in its second year, and we are really proud of our first batch of 10 students who recently passed the Board exams with flying colors, getting all A+ and A's

In addition to scholastics, Deaf Reach provides vocational courses for both students and young adults. The courses range from ICT, beautician, stitching & embroidery, teacher training, culinary arts, and many more. These vocational programs feed directly into our Job Placement Program, where more than 700 Deaf youth have been employed throughout the industrial and service sectors.

The MOVE Program (Motivated Volunteer Empowerment), an Eduserve project, engages Pakistani youth in meaningful community development and leadership skills. Conducted in schools and colleges around the country, MOVE effects social change by encouraging students to identify the needs in their communities and to plan and implement innovative solutions and social action projects.

(GU): Would you please share your success story with our readers?

Success is never a short term event. It reminds me of the parable of the Chinese bamboo plant – something I like to share with parents particularly. I'll explain briefly:

Like any plant, the Chinese bamboo requires nurturing, fertile soil, water and sunshine. In the first year, after planting the bulb and watering, there are no visible signs of activity. This happens again in the second, third and fourth year: Your patience is tested and you wonder if all your efforts will be rewarded.

Then all of a sudden in the fifth year, a little sprout emerges from ground. Within 90 days, the same little sprout suddenly grows to 80 feet!

So did the bamboo grow 80 feet in 90 days, or in 5 years?

I think our story is very similar to that of the Chinese bamboo plant. We started with very small beginnings and a committed team. By being faithful on a day to day basis and focusing on our key goals, the project continued to grow and has now reached a point where we have gained a certain level of success. Looking back from our vantage point today, we're very proud of how far we have come, but we also recognize — looking forward — how much more we can do and how much further we have to go.

(GU): Please share a formative and/or interesting experience with us.

A defining factor in my life was our first child, who be-



came deaf shortly after birth. All the heartache and challenges that we faced in raising him have served a larger purpose, preparing us to start a program that would help other parents with deaf children.

When we first came to Pakistan nearly 30 years ago, we saw there was little in the way of quality education for deaf children. My wife, Heidi, and I started a small tutorial program in a little one-room office space someone donated to us in Saddar area where we had 15 students. That small project has now grown to our present 6 full time schools, and the resulting impact they've had on thousands of lives.

(GU): As an entrepreneur, what is your mission statement?

That anything is possible when you put your mind to it, especially if the cause is just and the need is there. Then, regardless of resources, regardless of circumstances, all things are possible and can be done.

On the face of it, Pakistan would not be considered a likely place to accomplish something because of all the perceived hindrances. But on the flip side, this provides great opportunity because there is such a great need! When you meet an obstacle, if you can't go through it, you must learn to go around it - and if you can't go around it, you go over it, and if you can't go over it, go under it - and when you don't give up is when success happens. Our team is very committed, and that has been a huge measure of our success.

(GU): What is your educational and personal background?

I did my university in the U.S., studying in the field of ed-

ucation. I was considering practicing medicine and completed a pre-med program, but I had an epiphany one day. I asked myself some hard questions: Is this what I really want to do? Am I going to commit the next 10 years of my life studying so that one day I may help to improve people's lives? By that time, would I have the same passion and desire? Because I was young and idealistic, I wanted to make an immediate difference in the world. So I got involved in social development projects in the US. I was working with kids from the streets with drug problems, homeless people, disadvantaged people, and I found that very satisfying on a personal level. I then had the opportunity to go abroad, and continued social development projects in Europe, Latin America and some different countries for a while. One thing led to another and I've never looked back. I've been in the social development sector for over 45 years now.

(GU): What is leadership to you?

I think a good leader is a servant. He serves the people who work for him. He makes their jobs as doable as possible. He makes whatever they need as accessible as possible. His real role is to facilitate and empower everyone in the organization because they're doing what they do probably better than he could in their position — that's why they are hired. And by supporting and empowering those on his team, he ultimately strengthens and grows the organization.

(GU): What do you think is the reason behind the success of FESF?

I think it's the core commitment of the people working at FESF that drives our success. The management team is very small, and also very hands on, at work daily on proj-



ects — not just desk-sitting. Our Deaf Reach program is comprised of over 150 teachers plus another 70 support staff. Our MOVE & Eduserve programs are staffed with committed trainers that are developing new training modules and implementing programs nationwide. Everyone at FESF - from janitor to head teachers to regional managers, are all passionate about their job and what they are doing. They believe in the vision, they believe in the mission, and they are committed to it.

(GU): What are the major challenges that you face with deaf students?

In any developing country - not only Pakistan - there is a huge gap in the awareness and understanding of the needs of children with disabilities. This is usually due to lack of education, as well as lack of successful community



awareness programs. As the majority of children come from families with low income and low education, there is a great deal of ignorance and superstition inherent in the culture. The government is not very well informed or able to meet their needs, and the needs of children with disabilities are often sidelined and very low on the list of priorities. So it's essential that organizations like ours fill in the role of being the voice for marginalized communities.

(GU): Unfortunately, in Pakistan there is not a great deal of understanding or acceptance of the Deaf, including their ability to access education, health and basic human rights. Tell us your future plans to change mindsets and how you envision acceptance of the Deaf in Pakistani society.

Our motto is very clear: "Deaf people can do anything except hear!" If we view the Deaf community not as a disability group, but as a minority culture that speaks another language (sign language), our perception changes. We then realize that to succeed, the Deaf need empowerment through education, the same opportunity that is everyone's right. if any minority group is given training and education in their native language, they prosper.

Lack of language is a lack of empowerment, and we set out to change that paradigm by developing the first ever online digital Sign Language dictionary in Pakistan. Now, for the first time, PSL is available free of cost country wide with a 5,000 word dictionary. You can access it at www.psl.org.pk, and also download the PSL app for your phone. For those without connectivity, we also created a 1,000 Basic Signs book, which is translated into seven languages: PSL, English, Urdu, Punjabi, Sindhi, Pashto and Balochi.

The Deaf community, their families and educators now have instant access to their native language. This is hugely empowering. It is the foundation to basic education and literacy which then leads to access to employment, and community services. Our goal is to empower others so that they can lead a productive life.

(GU): How do you see the future of Pakistan with context to the rights of special people?

Pakistan has been a signatory of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, as well as the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. This is a great step, but we know implementation will take time to reach the grass roots, the people who need it the most and that's where a lot of disconnect is. There is a lot of potential to do well, and the more the government engages with the private sector and organizations like ourselves, the faster we can move towards these goals. We can ad-



vocate, we can join together, we can build platforms to make things happen. The government, the private sector, and NGOs, on their own, can't accomplish all that needs to happen. But partnership is a great model that has proven effective and will continue impact more people in the coming years. A public-private partnership is the quickest way to get things done.

(GU): Please, share your experience of working with other organizations.

We've had a successful partnership with the Sindh Government where they've provided some start up funding and the use of underutilized buildings on a rent-free basis for some of our schools — a great example of a public-private partnership that is benefitting so many deaf children, the end beneficiaries who most need it.

We always like to partner where possible, especially if there's equal amounts of passion and vision and the will to get things done. We were able to collaborate with other organizations who work with the Deaf to create the award winning Pakistan Sign Language online dictionary, which is now being used nationwide. Granted, not every NGO we connect with is a perfect fit, but there are many that are doing superb work, and we are proud to be connected with them.

(GU): How do you feel about the track your professional life has taken you?

My life has been very fulfilling and very rewarding, and I have no regrets. There have been many challenges and a lot of ups and downs, but even when things were difficult, they weren't necessarily discouraging. People are

looking for different things in their lives. Many feel that making a lot of money is the ultimate goal, while others choose a more altruistic path. I can say that I've had a very fulfilling life, one that has brought me personally much peace and happiness. I wake up every day looking forward to what will happen. I don't look at what I do as work. It's my life's passion, and it's exciting!

(GU): Please highlight the important role a person's attitude plays towards his/ her work?

I think attitude is probably the most important attribute that anyone can bring to an organization — and having a positive, can-do attitude is crucial when working in the development sector. There's a quote that I often share with others: Your attitude determines your altitude, and your attitude should be gratitude. I've always lived by that and I think others that work in social development, in a sense, need to also.

(GU): Why and where, in your opinion, is the Pakistan education sector lacking?

Pakistan as a people and a nation are so adaptable and high achievers. Where the system functions, it functions so well it surpasses developed nation's educational programs at times. Sad to say, this is more the exception than the rule, especially as education in Pakistan is a business, and the ones that suffer are the ones that can't afford it: the less privileged ones. Those with access to education do well but sadly there's a huge gap. There is still a large percentage of Pakistan's population without access to education. Basic education for PWDs remains very difficult, and Higher education is almost non-

existent, something that needs to be remedied.

(GU): How can we work together to initiate inclusive education in different organizations?

For many PWDs, inclusive education can be a great success, as there is greater access to better educational facilities through inclusive education programs. For the Deaf, especially the profoundly deaf, access to education through sign language remains the biggest challenge to inclusive education. If interpreters are available and well trained, then the Deaf can easily integrate into inclusive education systems.

(GU): Has the political situation of Pakistan ever hindered your progress?

The political situation has not been any more of a hindrance to our efforts than it has to the rest of the country. As I said earlier, Pakistan is a county of challenges. It's not a smooth road, and you can expect difficulties and challenges. At the end of the day, you either give up or fight harder.

There is an over-riding law that seems to be part of Pakistan's makeup, and that is Murphy's Law: If anything can go wrong, it will go wrong. To deal with that, there are 2 key abilities above all that are needed by anyone who joins FESF: Adaptability and Flexibility. With those in hand, all challenges can be met.

(GU): Are there membership or volunteering opportunities for the youth?

We have an amazing volunteer program. Last year we had close to 1,000 volunteers. Our Motivated Volunteer Empowerment (MOVE) Program is conducted at schools and

colleges around the country. We conduct focused workshops on leadership, community building, etc. At the end of the course, participating students plan and implement a community project with our oversight. We also have formal internship opportunities at our Deaf Reach Schools. Anyone interested in volunteering should please get in contact with us.

(GU): What is the secret behind your progress and achievements in life?

So many people are looking for the elusive X-Factor, or some secret to success. For me, I call it the God factor. When I was a

young man, and faced with so many career options and choices, I asked God to take control of my life and help me do something with it to help others. Its all happened the way it's needed to happen, which is beyond human control.

(GU): How are you using social media as a tool in your organization?

I never did, but then along came Sarah Sheikh (our Marketing Director), and via her use of social media and awareness campaigns transformed our entire organization into a more cutting edge, engaged organization that

is getting its message across to millions in an unbelievable way. She's done an amazing job with it, and you can see some of this impact when viewing the "National Anthem in Sign Language" (National Anthem) which had over 4 million views. Or Coke Studio for the Deaf, which went viral with close to 5 million views (Coke Studio for the Deaf). And a fun one to watch is our "Don't Say it, Sign it" campaign (Shahid Afridi).

(GU): How important is time management to your success?

I think it's extremely important that people manage their time wisely. Time management is an internal process and not an external one. We don't mandate it here, because we believe in quality of work done and not the quantity of hours spent doing it. A professional gives their 100% because that's what the priority is. We trust that people are doing so, and it will show in their end results without us micromanaging them.

(GU): What advice would you give for someone who would like to advance in this field?

I think that if someone's going to work in the social development sector, the best thing for them to do is get some basic experience. They need to learn firsthand what it means to do something that makes a difference in someone else's life and experience the satisfaction that comes from that. One of the best ways to do this is to volunteer or intern for a time with an active organization, which will give someone a better understanding and feel for things.

(GU): Where do you see yourself as an organization in the next few years?

Our work has grown organically. There were opportunities that presented themselves and we just took them on. We haven't said 'no' very often, but now, having reached where we are today, we want to make our model replicable, scalable and cost effective. There's over 1 million deaf children of school age in Pakistan but hardly 2% have access to education. That's a massive gap. There's a huge scope for replication of our educational system. We don't see ourselves opening dozens of new schools unless we have some amazing funding to support that, as the cost of running our brick-and-mortar model is substantial.

I see two future goals here, one being to create partnerships with existing and like-minded organizations, get them engaged, and start deaf education training programs. Secondly, the creation of more digital resources and tutorials which can be disseminated that will provide opportunities for greater literacy and empowerment for the Deaf community.

(GU): Any message for our students and/or for the youth of Pakistan?

65% of Pakistan's population is under the age of 25 years! There's tremendous energy and potential in that demographic. I would encourage young people to step outside the traditional routes outlined as "pathways to success" - and to make time to engage in other activities that help build creativity, people skills and community engagement. Serving in a volunteer or internship capacity with a hands-on CBO (community based organization) can provide an experience that can be life-changing, and a base for a more well rounded career.

Sarah is a marketing professional with expertise in brand management and project development. She has worked in the FMCG, IT, and Education sectors developing brands for mid-sized companies. Sarah has worked across Pakistan, the UAE, Myanmar and USA over 16 years. As Development Director at FESF, Sarah manages the global brand communication and donor engagement strategies for the FESF programs: Deaf Reach and Eduserve.

Greenwich University (GU): Please tell something about the Organization you working for?

Sara Shaikh (S S): Family Educational Services Foundation is a not for profit that has been operating in Pakistan for over two decades. It was established by a group of like-minded expats and has grown into a mid-sized organization with over 200 full time employees working across Pakistan in the education and social development sector.

(GU): What is the mission of FESF?

(\$ S): FESF aims to serve and empower the less privileged youth in Pakistan through its programs Deaf Reach (www.deafreach.com) and Eduserve.

(GU): Tell us about your professional journey?

(S.S.) While studying at Greenwich University I was fortunate enough to get a position at an HR Consultancy run by two dynamic women, a novelty in the 90's Pakistan! I worked on special projects with them and was later hired as a Brand Manager for Soya Supreme. After six years I moved on to work with a consultancy in UAE and later an international brand of British Universities to establish their brand in Burma.

Coming back to Pakistan was a challenge when the financial markets crashed globally. But it was a turning point in my career when I decided to channel my skills into developing people along with brands. Over the past 16 years I have been fortunate enough to take up leadership roles and serve the community simultaneously. This resulted in my decision to join FESF as a Marketing Communications Manager with the goal to take an unknown yet impactful project and build a brand. After six years in



this sector and having worked my way up to Development Director for the organization, I can say this has been the most fulfilling role I have had to date.

(GU): When and how did you join FESF?

(S S): I've known the founders of FESF now for 16 years. I met them via our CSR program when I first started working at Soya Supreme and then again after a gap of ten years! Not only was I surprised to see this talented group of expats STILL living in Pakistan, but I was amazed that they had grown from a small set — up and were reaching out to all corners of Pakistan. My first reaction was, wow this story needs to be told, and more people need to have access to these special services.

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The management is driven and passionate and after a few discussions we decided I would take a pay cut and give up my VP level position overseas and give back to the country for a year. Six years later, the country and FESF have given more growth and professional development opportunities to me than I could envision when taking the plunge.

(GU): How does FESF facilitate the citizens of Pakistan?

(S S): The two programs run by FESF are unique and serve the community on two levels.

Eduserve facilitates teacher training and youth development across the country in partnership with leading multi nationals and youth development organizations. On an annual basis over 2,000 youth and teachers are facilitated through these projects with over 80,000 beneficiaries.

The flagship program for the foundation is the Deaf Reach Program which services the Deaf community on a national level. The six schools and training centers are populated by over 1,400 students and are utilized for resource and teacher development on a continual basis for the past decade.

(GU): How do you promote FESF?

(S S): Earlier the organization was utilizing PR tools to reach out to the local community to garner support for the project. Six years ago I started working on the PR com-

munication and streamlined the branding elements, created the voice and strategy for outreach, and we decided to capitalize on social media.

The first stage was to inform and educate people of the challenge. Since deafness is invisible to most people, we had to share statistics and inform people re the large number of deaf community members and their families in need of services.

The second stage was to create video and print communications to provide a solution via the Deaf Reach Schools and Training Centers. This changed the mindsets of existing and new patrons of the project.

The third stage is to share the successes of the project and keep the patrons abreast of the developments in the Deaf world on a global level.

(GU): Would you like to share the success stories of some of the projects done by you at FESF so far?

(S S): Documenting and creating a new language, with our team of Deaf educators, Pakistan Sign Language (PSL) was one of the most challenging projects – the result was the creation of streamlined learning resources that were distributed across all of Pakistan and also won the PASHA Award! Who gets to create a new language in the 21st Century?





The Job Placement Program has resulted in a liaison with local and multinational corporations allowing the placement of over 500 well trained Deaf employees in companies such as KFC, UBL, Pizza Hut MCR, Allied Caterpillar and DHL among others.

(GU): How did GU help you in achieving your goals?

(S S): As a scholar at GU I was fortunate enough to have a faculty that had mastery of content in humanities, arts, science and business. The professors were able to tap into our creative skills and intellect. While there was a core focus on our specific discipline of choice, we were exposed to multiple fields and I left GU well prepared for my career and life.

(GU): How do you balance your personal and professional life?

(S S): Whether its last minute travel, attending seminars, pushing deadlines for a digital project, or spending quality time with family and friends, I find being organized allows me to give quality time to both my personal and business obligations.

It's also important to find time for health management and set routines early in life to manage your energy well. Being a workaholic I have set strict deadlines for device usage, rest/sleep and yoga.

I fiercely guard my schedule and to-do list as Pakistan has an unpredictable political environment. I never want to put off work or personal appointments for the next day.

(GU): In a nut shell, what is the basic factor a person

needs to rise?

(S S): Humility, intelligence and dedication are the best combination I can think of. Self - direction is very important as you are responsible for your growth, but above all it is the passion to serve others that makes you go far.

(GU): What career advice would you give to all Greenwichians?

(S S): To stay relevant you have to work hard and smart in any field you choose, so make sure you choose one that you're passionate about! Travel as much as you can and gain cross cultural experiences and develop your interpersonal skills.

Read a lot, about the world, career choices, changing mindsets and ideas that conflict with your beliefs. Take (calculated) risks early in your career and remember - an overnight success has 15 years of hard work behind it!

(GU): What experiences would you recommend for someone who would want to advance in this field, realizing that little is being done in our society?

(S S): Pakistan offers great opportunities for volunteerism and I would strongly advise anyone considering this sector as a career choice to start early on. Similar to how I first engaged in social development, not realizing at the time that it would lead to a career choice, but the seed of caring for and about others was sown, and later, when the time was right, matured and grew. Even if its not a career choice, being in involved in a community projects while building education and career goals is an impor-





tant part of one's formative years, and helps inculcate and sense of empathy and understanding of the world around, something crucial to becoming a quality leader/professional.

(GU): Please inform us about your initiatives, innovations or achievements or contribution to FESF.

(S S): Under my stewardship our outreach has expanded from reaching local donors to connecting with large aid agencies from across the world, as well as building a support network amongst the international Pakistani community.

Our capacity for Deaf Reach was expanded from 600 students in 3 schools to 1,400 in 6 schools and training centers. The project has expanded from a USD 0.6 million funding requirement to USD 1.4 million in 6 years as I have been able to manage customized development projects.

The Pakistan Sign Language project is now recognized internationally and has led to a partnership with counterparts in Chile, South America to develop ongoing digital learning resources.

Some of the digital initiatives that are very dear to me include the responsive website www.deafreach.com, the

National Anthem video in Pakistan Sign Language that was viewed globally by over 3 million people www.psl.org.pk and Coke Studio for the Deaf which launched season 9.

I've also worked on creating the Dast'khat brand for showcasing products made by Deaf artisans to develop a platform for sustainability.

We have been fortunate enough to get leading agencies on board like IAL Satchi, GrayScale, Bond Advertising, Digitz, Ambience Films and GroCode that have supported the project via their marketing and design contributions in the past 6 years.

(GU): According to you what role do educationists have to uplift the deteriorating condition of special people in Pakistan

(S S): I think educationists can have a great impact in present times as there is a youth-driven push to serve the community. It would be an excellent idea to start off sensitivity training in college and utilize the social sciences department to run interventions for special needs development.

Universities can partner with us and allow each batch of students to design a project that facilitates awareness of the special needs persons in Pakistan, or do case studies, fundraising drives and perhaps start the Pakistan Sign Language basic course at the university level.

(GU): As an alumnus how would you contribute to strengthen Greenwich Alumni to work positively for the University and community?

(S S): As a representative of the university I have been very fortunate to have a solid global experience carrying the GU name and have found my passion in serving the community. While I have been able to give externally, I would also like to give back to the University by facilitating courses on social development and youth training.

(GU): Your message for the students of Greenwich University.

(S S): We are all very fortunate to have the means and intellect to map out our life. There are many in Pakistan who will never have the opportunity or desire to overcome the barriers of caste, poverty, gender and accessibility. It's our moral responsibility to do more than hand out money in charity. I think with all the skills we have, giving some years of your career to a not-for-profit may create the biggest impact on your career and the country.


Furthermore, he discussed with the students that most people falsely think that you are either born a creative thinker or not. The truth is creative thinkers intuitively know how to think and be outside the box.

The theme of the conference was "Transform Lives. Innovate for the Poor". 
Women Action Forum - 'When Empathy helps Productivity'

families, perceived that many of the laws proposed by the President Muhammad Zia-ul-Haq government were discriminatory and would compromise their civil status.


In Karachi, Lahore, and Islamabad the group agreed on collective leadership and formulated policy statements and engaged in political action to safeguard women's legal position



Research also suggests that puppet shows can be a predominantly effective tool for advocacy and communi-





We will now provide IQRA free of cost to any family, school, or organization working with deaf children, making it possible or any deaf child in Pakistan to gain literacy





skills."

Dr. Marvin G. Weinbaum visits Greenwich University

Greenwich University hosted a Guest Speaker Session, organized by US Consulate, Karachi. The speaker, Dr. Marvin G. Weinbaum, is one of the renowned academicians, Professor Emeritus of political science at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He has served as analyst for Pakistan and Afghanistan in the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research from 1999 to 2003. He is currently a scholar-in-residence at the Middle East Institute in Washington DC. He conducted a lecture on "Pakistan - Afghan - Iran Relationship and long term stability in the region".

Dr. Marvin G. Weinbaum is Professor Emeritus of Political Science at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and served as analyst for Pakistan and Afghanistan in the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research from 1999 to 2003. He is currently a scholar-inresidence at the Middle East Institute in Washington DC.

At Illinois, Dr. Weinbaum served for fifteen years as the director of the Program in South Asian and Middle Eastern Studies. His research, teaching, and consultancies have focused on the issues of national security, state building, democratization, and political economy in Afghanistan and Pakistan. He is the author or editor of six books and has written more than 100 journal articles and book chapters.

Dr. Weinbaum was awarded Fulbright Research Fellowships for Egypt in 1981–82 and Afghanistan in 1989–90, and was a senior fellow at the United States Institute of Peace in 1996–97. He has been the recipient of research awards from the Social Science Research Council, the Ford











Foundation, the American Political Science Association, and other granting agencies.

Dr. Weinbaum was accompanied by Mr. Adam Jagelski, Cultural Attache, US Consulate, Karachi and Ms. Ana Ayala, US Department of States. The Management, students and faculty members of Greenwich University attended the lecture with great zeal and some concrete, thought provoking questions were also raised by the students. The Goals of ECDNP are to develop understanding amongst all stakeholders/caregivers about concepts of holistic and inclusive ECD practices, facilitate government to realize and define key role of its ministries in promotion of holistic and inclusive development of all children, strengthen sharing of best practices, resources and collaborations among ECD stakeholders, collaborate with stakeholders for investments in promotion of ECD services, material development and thematic research grants The Objectives of ECDNP are that the Network will strive

to provide a national forum of networking and collaboration amongst all ECD stakeholders and ministries & departments of provincial and federal governments, to promote collaboration and sharing of resources, best practices and research work amongst various ECD organizations and individuals, to contribute in development of ECD policy, curriculum and training models (qualifications) across ECD training institutions and organizations in Pakistan, to collaborate with regional and international ECD networks to bring benefits of regional and international experiences to Pakistan and to work for mass awareness about importance of ECD through audiovisuals, print mediums and seminars.

A consultative dialogue on the status of ECD in Sindh was held on Dec 01, 2016, organized by Early Childhood Development Network Pakistan (ECDNP). More than 30 organizations working on Early Childhood Development and Education participated and shared their work in the ECE. It all began from November 05, 2015 when students of Department of Mass Communication and Media Studies, Greenwich University along with their course In Charge, Ms. Tahira Tariq, Lecturer, Dept. of MCMS in collaboration with Karachi Traffic Police organized an on road campaign against violation of traffic rules by practically viewing traffic violations at different traffic signals near Sultan Masjid DHA Karachi. The objective of this campaign was to create awareness in our youth to follow traffic rules in order to avoid traffic accidents and loss of precious lives.

Mr. Ameer Ahmed Sheikh who was then DIG Traffic Police also joined the said campaign and was of the view that it was the first ever campaign of this type in our country. According to him the first benefit of this campaign to general public and students was that they learned violation of traffic rules by practically participating in the campaign. The second benefit was that the traffic police officers who were present on the scene explained the traffic violations on the spot so any confusion or misunderstanding about the traffic rules was cleared. The third benefit of the campaign was that the students present at the campaign conveyed the message of road safety to their friends and family thus promoting our cause to a number of people who were not present or



were unable to attend. He also suggested the need of the same campaign to be repeated on different locations so that a large number of students and general public may be benefited.

Above suggestion of DIG Traffic Police Sindh was discussed this year in class with the students of three courses, Theories of Communication, Development Communication and News Writing and Reporting by their Course Instructor, Ms. Tahira Tariq. It was decided that the same campaign be repeated on different locations and the issue must be highlighted for the information of general public and road safety rules may be conveyed to the general public of our city.

The main cause of traffic accidents in Karachi was discussed with Mr. Asif Ejaz Sheikh now DIG Traffic Police so that the line of action for our second campaign could be planned. According to him the increase in population has given rise to more traffic on our roads.

The increase in traffic on the same old roads have increased the number of traffic accidents and our roads are growing dangerous day by day. No doubt, old roads and









high speed driving are the main causes of traffic accidents but our people do not observe the traffic rules. Careless driving, leaving late and wish to reach in time by driving fast, overtaking and driving on the wrong side of the road are the main cause of road accidents. Driving on wrong side of the road is creating hour long traffic jams and is very common in Karachi. Due to these traffic jams time and fuel is wasted.

With the help of DIG Traffic strategy for our second campaign was decided which was to educate people by creating awareness of traffic rules and to remind every commuter about safe driving by displaying road safety messages. By placing road safety awareness posters and banners at prominent places near our second campaign venue and by repeating few messages at a time, long lasting effects can be created.

As a Corporate Social Responsibility towards society, management of Greenwich University came forward with the students. Traffic police authorities and other concerned authorities were contacted to launch a campaign against violation of traffic rules and place road safety awareness signs at different locations in collaboration with traffic police. The total cost of printing and installing road safety messages were to be borne by Greenwich University. The permission was granted by the concerned authorities and date and location was mutually decided with Traffic police and was fixed on Saturday, November 26, 2016 at Mac Donald's Round about near Sea View.

On the event day a beautiful stage decorated with the pictures of our first campaign erected near Mac Donald's at Sea View for guests and students. Carefully designed road safety awareness posters and banners were

displayed to create awareness of traffic rules on prominent places around the venue.

A large number of general public, media, students and faculty members participated in the campaign. Our Honorable Chancellor, Ms. Seema Mughal and Registrar Mr. Saeed Mughal also graced the campaign. A police Brass Band continuously played music of different patriotic songs while marching around the venue and created more enthusiasm among students and all those who were present at the campaign.




