

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EDUCATION FOR SOCIAL TRANSFORMATION

Greenwich grants 100% scholarships to transgender persons

Commemorating the Trans Day of Remembrance, Greenwich University, on Saturday, 23rd November 2021, signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Gender Interactive Alliance, for the promotion of transgender persons' education through the provision of fully-funded scholarships by the University.

This measure makes Greenwich University Pakistan's first varsity to offer free of charge undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate education to transgender persons. To mark this feat and celebrate trans rights, an event was held at the University on the day.

The event was organised to put forth a request to all government and bureaucratic stakeholders as well as civil society and the business community to cultivate dignified employment opportunities for transgender persons. Efforts made thus far by various stakeholders to secure trans rights in Pakistan were also showcased on the occasion.

The ceremony kicked off with a welcome address, which was followed by the profile of renowned trans rights activist, forebearer of the Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights Act 2018), Ms. Bindiya Rana.



Ms. Bindiya, who is also the Chairperson of the GIA, lauded Greenwich University's step to support transgender persons' right to education and dignified livelihood. She underscored that transgender persons are considered taboo in Pakistani society to this day. This exclusion of trans people from the social, political and economic fabric of the country, exposes them to physical and psychological abuse besides depriving them of economic means for survival, said Ms. Bindiya.

The dearth of educational opportunities further exacerbates the situation against trans persons, she said. Although Pakistan is taking steps to promote transgender rights, and headways have been made in this regard, a lot still needs to be done to uplift the transgender community to make equal opportunities available to them, noted Ms. Bindiya. Greenwich University's measure to promote transgender persons' education is a huge step in the right direction, she said.

Ms. Sara Gill, Pakistan's first transgender doctor also attended the ceremony and spoke of struggles she faced in her academic and professional career. "The identity-based discrimination of transgender persons is keeping Pakistan from progressing both as a society and as an economy. We need to rid ourselves of gender-based biases and cultivate opportunities for talent acquisition," she noted.

Addressing the ceremony, Ali Jillani, Head Diplomatic Affairs, Greenwich University, said that the inclusion of transgender persons in educational institutions and will undoubtedly transform and counter societal misconceptions of the community. Across the globe, the struggle for trans rights has remained magnificent in gaining liberty from the predominant social constructs, he added. Trans persons are welcome aboard at workplaces and educational opportunities are offered to them. It is an honor for us to have a vibrant trans rights community in Pakistan. We feel proud of utilizing our platform for

the promotion of trans rights, he concluded.

During the ceremony members of the GIA also performed an interactive theatre on trans rights. Moreover, the outstanding documentary film, 'Main Insaan Hoon' (I am a human!/ too), advocating trans rights to education and employment, produced by Greenwich University's media students was shown. The brilliantly made documentary highlights the exclusion of transgender persons and shows that such exclusion renders trans people inhuman and unworthy of a dignified life.

Appreciating the efforts of Greenwich University and GIA, Chief Guest of the event, Ms. Reema Ismail, wife of Governor Sindh, said that "the government is seriously pondering over changing the social fabric of society. This includes the inclusion of transgender persons and acknowledgment of trans rights. Change is around the corner. However, the gradual change, the more sustainable it will be. I am delighted to come across the enthusiasm with which we, as a society, are moving forward".

Speaking at the ceremony, the Vice-Chancellor of Greenwich University, Ms. Seema Mughal, said that "I see Greenwich's vision of social transformation through education materializing today, as we open our doors to the trans community". She vowed to continue support from the transgender community at the University. "I assure everyone that Greenwich will contribute its due share to Pakistan as a society and economy. The Greenwich family will always ensure its efforts towards the progression of society, our foundation, being education."

The event concluded with the distribution of certificates and awards and was followed by the MoU signing ceremony. ■







Greenwich faculty members attended the workshop held virtually and physically.

This workshop is the first among the workshops designed as part of the Greenwich University Faculty Development Program. This Faculty Development Program aims to increase the capacity of Greenwich faculty.

The workshop began with great energy. Following the discussion on the seminar agenda, the lead instructor Dr. Abdul Wahid Usmani, Advisor QEC, and faculty members delved into a deeper discussion on the genesis of courses, the evolution of learning frameworks according to the modern trends in education, and the instructor reviewed course outlines drafted by the staff. In lieu, the instructor introduced and discussed the guidelines provided by HEC.



Faculty members engaged in an elaborate and insightful discussion on value additions by the QEC. Discussion on the assessment framework consolidated the importance of systematically measuring learning objectives to achieve extraordinary instructor and learner capacity. Evaluation of the Greenwich learner profile led to developing a rough scheme of learning offered at Greenwich.

Furthermore, the faculty discussed the benefits of assessing students learning outcomes holistically. QEC shared the developed criteria and pathway to achieve a holistic assessment framework with the faculty.

The instructor also shared the list of essential readings and information charts to facilitate a profound understanding of the course outline, HEC guidelines, and assessment among the faculty members.

The session concluded with a briefing on the agenda of the upcoming workshop. Faculty were briefed on the tasks to be accomplished by faculty to have a fruitful session. ■

Kirpal Dass Melani

Kirpal dass, a Hindu scholar and researcher was the first of these guest speakers. Kirpal Dass covered all the basics of Hinduism and Sikhism. He told about the history of Hinduism and how it started over 4000 years ago around the Indus



Valley. Kirpal Dass told about the various scriptures like the Ramayana and the 4 Vedas and gods and goddesses that are worshipped by the Hindus and how they were all a part of Brahma, a single Universal god for the Hindus.



Reverend Benjamin Shehzad

Students were extremely excited for this session and Father Benjamin Shehzad was requested to come to the university on high demand from the students. Christianity is a religion which is similar to Islam in many ways, that is probably one of the reasons the students of this course were very interested in the session. Father Benjamin Shehzad's style of answering the student's queries was very much appreciated by the students. Everytime he was asked a question about Christianity or what Christianity has to say about something he would open the Bible and quote examples from the Holy Book. I feel safe in Pakistan, it is my Country and I love it", this was applauded by the student audience.



Dr. Kiran Shahid Siddiqui

Dr. Kiran who specializes in Gandhara art, the visual art of the Buddhists and also serves as an assistant professor of the department of history at Karachi University came to Greenwich university as well to give a lecture on Buddhism. Even though she is a follower of Islam but because of her



expertise in the Gandhara art which is directly related to Buddhism, her knowledge about the religion was immense. The main focus of her lecture was to tell the students about the introduction of Buddhism, the life story of Siddharta Gautama Buddha, his teachings and how the religion spread in different parts of the world. Buddhism is different from the other main religions because it is believed to be more of a philosophy of life than a religion.



Mufti Abdul Rahman

Mufti Abdul Rehman, an Islamic scholar and preacher who is also the head Imam in Malawi, responsible for plenty of religious conversions towards Islam. He also served in various banks as the Shariah advisor and compliance officer.

Mufti Abdul Rehman started his lecture by sharing what



misconceptions people have towards Islam having seen the culture in Africa and beyond by his own experience. He cleared the misunderstandings of the students about their religion in a short question and answer session. Mufti Abdul Rehman not only spoke about Islam but also told the students why religious harmony is so important in this day and age.

Mufti Faisal has held various trainings for time management and meditation across various countries. Addressing the students, DG Rangers said that writers usually abstain from predicting the future but are more conversant with current trends and innovations. Quoting Yuval Noah


Harari, he said that; every ten years, any generation needs to reinvent.




ART, A REFLECTION OF LIFE
