The Prime Minister announced reward of Rs 500,000 each for those athletes who won gold medals at the Athens Olympics, Rs 300,00 for silver medal winners and Rs 100,000 for bronze medal winners. Whereas a Rs100,000 cash reward was announced for each coach.

The Motorway and Highway Police distributed informative pamphlets on the Islamabad highway, to the motorist about the preventive measures to be taken to fight the disease.




Mini tourist train will start its journey from Rose and Jasmine Garden with a speed of 20 to 25 kilometers per hour and will cover different landmarks of the city.

Pak Frigate on maritime security mission in Kuwait

ISLAMABAD, July 11: An American Perry class frigate is now on its way to Pakistan, after being refurbished and manned by 240 Pakistani sailors. After 30 years service in the US Navy, the USS McInerney was retired, then underwent \$69 million of refurbishment before entering Pakistani service. The refurb included the addition of more anti-submarine capabilities, Strategy Page reported.

The Perry's are 4,100 ton ships that have a crew of 220 and are armed with a 76mm gun, six tubes for launching Mk 46 anti-submarine torpedoes, and a 20mm auto cannon as anti-missile defence. As built, the Perry's had a missile launcher for SM-1 anti-aircraft or Harpoon anti-ship missiles (from a 40 missile magazine), but these were removed from all US Perrys in 2004. This was done because US allies needed the dwindling supply of SM-1 missiles more than US ships did.

The two SH-60 helicopters carried by the Perrys could still use their smaller Penguin anti-ship missiles. The Perrys have air search radar and sonar, and a top speed of 55 kilometres an hour. If Pak built today, the Perry's would cost about \$300 million each.

Pakistan plans to use its Perry class frigate for the anti-piracy patrol off Somalia. But the enhanced antisubmarine capabilities indicate service against Indian subs as well.

Vegetable Exports up by 87 percent

KARACH July 10: Export of vegetables and fruits from Pakistan registered an increase of 87.01 percent and 16.55 percent in value terms, respectively, during the last eleven months of the 2010/11, a lead-fruits worth \$26.1 million were exported during the period from July to May2010/11, which was 16.55 percent higher than 446,516 tonnes of fruits worth \$22.4 million exported in the same period of 2009/10, Ahmad Jawad, CEO, Harvest Tradings 590, 503 tonnes, which earned \$20.6 millions in 2010/11.

Country earned \$1,973 thousand by exporting legumious vegetables (pulses) during last eleven months of the year 2010/11. The export of pulses was recorded at only 37 tonnes during the same period.

However, rice export from the country observed negative growth as export of the commodity decreased by 0.69 percent as about 3,411,726 tonnes of rice exported in last 11 months of last financial year as compared with 3,771,986 tonnes of rice exported during the same period of fiscal 2009/10.

CLASSICAL MUSIC IN PAKISTAN

KARACHI, July 5: Three-month summer workshop to learn flute, tabla, harmonium and vocals began in Karachi on Monday.

Ustad Hanif, the coach, said that the workshop aims at training aspiring singers and instrument players the basics. "There is a misconception that learning classical music takes very long. I believe that like any other activity, students can start practising as soon as they get some basic music education."



He hoped to transfer the necessary skills to students over the three months. He said that approaches to teaching had changed overtime. "In old times, the ustads were illiterate people but still learned in the arts. Today's educated people should feel more confident about mastering it," he said.

He said learning was primarily about brains not the "tools", a melodic voice or quick, deft fingers.

He regretted that classical music was fading In Pakistan. In India, he said, people were doing well to save the art. He said that some ustads transferred the knowledge slowly and made quick learning difficult. "It took my ustad five years to teach me how to count the beats. I feel I can teach it to my students within three months given they put their effort and hard work," he said.

Ten-year-old twin sisters, Mahnoor and Mahrukh, have been Hanif's students since 2009. Their father, Tanveer, who also learned classical singing, said that after giving his daughters initial training in singing, he had sent them to Lok Rahs to learn flute playing.

Ali Zar, a Forman Christian College student, will also attend the workshop. He said he had also attended a dramatic workshop at Lok Rahs last year. "This year, I wanted to learn the harmonium to understand and appreciate classical music," he said.

Muhammad Arshad Mahmood, one of the workshop organizers, said that the security

Wapda told to expedite work on Tarbela dam expansion

ISLAMABAD, July 8: Water and Power Minister Syed Naveed Qamar has asked Wapda officials to expedite work on the Tarbela fourth extension project and complete it ahead of schedule. He issued the directive while presiding over a meeting during his visit to Tarbela dam.

After completion, the project costing 756.9 million dollar will provide cheap electricity and help ease the power crisis in the country. The extension project will provide additional generating capacity more cheaply and cleaner than any thermal alternative with almost no long-term fuel cost. The project is considered to be very attractive because the dam, storage reservoir and tunnel have already been built and water supply has been assured.

Finally, on May 12,2011, the Pakistani flag was hoisted on Mount Everest for the second time. After Nazir Sabir, president of the Alpine Club.

Pakistan's Hassan Sadpara became the second Pakistani ever to conquer Everest.

But the extreme terrain of the Himalayas has not been the most challenging obstacle in the mountaineer's life, who struggles to make ends meet. Inspired by his father, Sadpara took a risk in pursuing moun-taineering but does not feel duly repaid. "I represented Pakistan in Nepal and hoisted the nation's flag on top of the world's highest peak. There should at least have been a federal representative at the airport to receive me," he says.

Mountaineering is one of the most challenging sports in the world, requiring the adventurer to risk his/her life but it does not get the same respect — and funding — as other sports in the country, despite the fact that Pakistan has immense potential for mountain-climbing. "Pakistan has 50 peaks above the height of 7,000m - that makes it a great tourist attraction. The government should develop infrastructure to attract foreign tourists," says Sadpara who feels that economic and security conditions deprive this industry of the attention it deserves. As a mountaineer Sadpara wishes to revive the tourism and adventure industry. "I am ready to establish a Mountaineering Training Institute in Skardu to train the youth if the government is ready to support it. This would be helpful in training local talent, and foreigners would

also be interested in attending such training institutes. It could ultimately be a good source of foreign exchange," he says.

Currently, there are hardly 20 countries that have their flags planted on the roof of the world and it is because of mountaineers like Nazir Sabir and Hassan Sadpara that Pakistan is one of them.

scans experienced a 20 percent reduction in lung cancer deaths compared to those screened using chest X-rays, a US study found.

The National Lung Screening Trial, conducted starting in 2002 among 53,454 patients at a high risk of developing lung cancer, is the first to show that screening using low-dose celical computed tomography can reduce lung cancer mortality by identifying tumors early.

Lung cancer is the most lethal form of cancer in the United States, where more than 94 million current or former smokers are at elevated risk of the disease.

Patients have often not learned they had lung cancer until they experience symptoms of the disease, at which time the cancer is likely advanced and has less chances of getting cured.

Scientists compared mortality rates between those current and former heavy smokers between the ages of 55 and 74 who received three annual screenings using low-dose CT scans compared to those receiving chest X-rays for the nearly decadelong study.

Participants had smoked at least a pack a day for a minimum of 30 years, and were current or former smokers without symptoms, signs or history of lung cancer.

A helical CT (computed tomography) uses X-rays to obtain a multi-

After ratification by Germany, the new Bilateral Investment Treaty has replaced the old agreement for protection of investment, which the two countries had signed in 1959. Germany is an important source of Foreign Direct Investment in Pakistan. "For the first time, we have a study that says, 'Yes, you can actually reduce lung cancer mortality in heavy smokers via screening.'

This is tremendous."Study co-author llana Gareen noted that the screening's impact should not be considered alone, but rather in tandem with diagnosis.

"The screening and subsequent diagnostic work-up will also impact patients' emotional and physical health and will result in increased levels of health care utilization," she said in a statement.

The research results, published online in the New England Journal of Medicine, provides a more detailed analysis of results first published in November 2010, along with additional data showing a stronger link between the use of the CT scans and a drop in mortality

SPORTS IMRAN BACKS ICC BAN ON GOVERNMENT MEDDLING

KARACHI: Pakistan's legendary former captain Imran Khan on Thursday welcomed a decision from cricket's governing body to ban political appointments, calling for a total revamp of the national board.

The ICC executive board on Thursday gave cricket boards 12 months to implement free elections and another 12-month grace period to enact the changes before any sanctions would be considered. The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB), whose chairman ljaz Butt was appointed by the president, was not immediately reachable for comment but it has threatened legal action in the past if the constitution is changed.

Khan told AFP that the PCB now had a chance to become a real institution if the system was overhauled.

"The amendment will help Pakistan as there is no transparency and accountability in the current set-up," Khan told AFP.

Pakistan Fast-Track Coaching Programme: Focus shifts from reverse swing to using the new ball

LAHORE, July 5: The Pakistan Fast-Track Coaching Programme kicked off in July and will be looking to shift the bowlers' focus from reverse swing to using the new ball more effectively after the International Cricket Council's (ICC) new regulation of using two new balls from each end.

The ICC executive committee in its recently-held annual meeting in Hong Kong recommended restricting the elective Powerplays to between the 16th and 40th over of each innings and also directed the use of two new balls per innings – one from each end – changes that will come into effect from October this year.

The ongoing PCB Fast-Track Coaching Programme is providing training to the country's top bowlers and



batsmen under the supervision of former fast-bowler Sarfaraz Nawaz and batsman Mohsin Khan and Ijaz Ahmed.

While on international tours, players do not have enough time to address the flaws in their technique with the coaches individually," PCB's Game and Development Director Intikhab Alam told reporters.

"So availing the spare time, we have organised this programme to dig into the players' techniques and help them make crucial improvements.

"On the first day in the morning session, we had lectures on various *Contd. on P.g 7* "But to gain full benefit, Pakistan must fix the cricket structure with a new constitution on regional grounds where officials are elected."

Khan said the changes could allow Pakistan to perform better.

"If we have our cricket structure right, Pakistan has more talent than anywhere in the world, and we will dominate the world," said Khan, who led Pakistan to their only World Cup title in 1992.

Former PCB chairman Arif Abassi said reform had long been needed. "I resigned in 1996 because there was uncalled for government interference when I wanted to make the PCB a private company with shares," said Abassi.

Abassi said the ICC was after Pakistan after a slew of public irregularities and said: "It's now time we find the right people to overhaul our system and who know how to do it," he said.

But fellow former PCB chief Khalid Mahmood rejected the ICC imposition as a violation of Pakistan's independence. "The ICC has no business to tell us how to run our cricket," said Mahmood, calling for legal action if necessary.

"We must resist on this and although legal action is the last resort, one has to back it because we have to draw a line on sovereignty," said Mahmood.

Former spinner lqbal Qasim thought Pakistan would have trouble in enacting the change.

"While other Boards like England and Australia have a proper system, Pakistan will face some problems in implementing the change and they will need to overhaul the system from grass-root level," said Qasim.

"We need to think out a proper plan, be it with the government's help, to implement the change in two years."

Bangladesh and Sri Lanka are also directly affected by the amendment as their cricketing affairs are similarly run on government directives.
