New Islamabad airport to be accomplished in a year

Prime Minister of Pakistan, Mian Nawaz Sharif has directed the authorities to accomplish the project of new Islamabad airport within a year's time – ARY News reports. According to details, the Prime Minister while taking notice of the delay in project, has also directed the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) to investigate the causes of hindrance in the construction. PM Nawaz visited the new Islamabad airport along with Defence Minister, Khawaja Asif, Information Minister, Pervez Rasheed and his special advisor, Shujaat Azeem. PM Nawaz witnessed different parts of the airport including the runway, domestic/international arrival and departure. He was briefed that the



project was proposed in 1984, however its ground-breaking took place in 2007, 98 percent of civil and refueling work of the airport has been accomplished. Nawaz Sharif expressed his annoyance at the delay and additional expenses on the project. He advised the Punjab Government to construct small dams for supplying water to the new airport and said that any further delay in the accomplishment of the project will not be tolerated at all.

Large-scale units switch over to alternatives for energy

The country's large-scale manufacturing (LSM) sector has started to grapple with the energy shortage situation, by reverting to 'alternative energy resources', the first quarterly report of the State Bank of Pakistan for FY14, revealed. One major advantage with the use of renewable energy is that as it is renewable it is therefore sustainable and so will never run out.

Renewable energy facilities generally require less maintenance than traditional generators. Their fuel being derived from natural and available resources reduces the costs of operation.

Even more importantly, renewable energy produces little or no waste products such as carbon dioxide or other chemical pollutants, so has minimal impact on the environment.

Renewable energy projects can also bring economic benefits to many regional areas, as most projects are located away from large urban centres and suburbs of the capital cities. These economic benefits may be from the increased use of local services as well as tourism.

Renewables are great for our energy portfolio because they are inexhaustible and won't pollute the planet for us or those of



future generations by emitting toxic chemicals and gases. While some regions and countries in the past have grown wealthy and benefitted from their proximity to coal, gas, and oil reserves, not all places have access fossil fuels, which has made economic development difficult in some areas. However, nearly every town has access to sunlight, wind, and the geothermal power from the Earth, so harnessing these sources of renewable energy could be a great democratizing force, offering affordable and plentiful power to every corner of the globe.

Prices for fossil fuels are skyrocketing as existing stockpiles are consumed, which is leading companies to use more expensive and hazardous extraction processes to recover these limited resources.

In a 'special section' added to the report, the central bank says that the energy availability in the country has been on the slippery slope over the past few years.

Turk and Chinese energy companies to work on alternative sources of energy in Pakistan

A three member delegation of the Turkish company 'Seul Energy' has met the Chief Minister of Punjab, Shahbaz Sharif. During the meeting a detailed discussion took place on energy production, alternative sources and specially the solar energy projects – ARY News reports. On this occasion, Shahbaz Sharif said that Pakistan has wide opportunities of energy production from hydel, thermal, solar and other alternative sources. He told that the companies investing in solar projects here are being provided all possi-

ble assistance. The Turk delegation told that both the countries have cordial terms and economic cooperation, whilst Seul Energy Company is interested in solar projects in Punjab. Meanwhile, the Chief Minister also met the representatives of a Chinese company and the meeting reviewed the possibilities of the construction hydel and other power projects in Pakistan. CM Shahbaz Sharif told the Chinese delegates that the Government of Pakistan is taking all the necessary measures to cope with the energy crisis here and it is striving to utilize all the resources including coal and solar energy, for this purpose.

King of fruits: Mango exporter sees 15% growth this season

With the next season starting in May, the country is likely to boost its mango exports by 15% and add two new markets this year, according to Babar Khan Durrani, CEO of Pakistan Horti Fresh Processing (Private) Limited – a joint venture between Durrani Associates and Government of Pakistan. "We are working on adding New Zealand and South Africa to our list of exports this year," Durrani said in an interview with The Express Tribune. "Most likely, we'll have good news in this regard," he said. Bullish on expanding exports to new markets, Durrani Associates has invested heavily in fruit processing technology. In 2012, it established a hot water treatment (HWT) plant in a joint venture with the government for post-harvest treatment and processing of fruits and vegetables.



The company continues to invest in technology. It has recently imported a fruit processing plant from the Netherlands for Rs200 million, which is in addition to the two plants it is operating out of Karachi. The third plant will raise combined processing capacity from the current 25 tons per hour to about 37 tons per hour.

This investment can be recovered in about five years, Durrani had said in a previous interview with The Express Tribune. His optimism seems to be justified as the technological advancement has already helped the company tap more markets.

Youth Loan programme: easy loans worth Rs3.7 billion

Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif on Friday offered to provide easy loans worth Rs 3.7 billion to help empower the country's youth.

In the past, Premier Nawaz said, only influential businesspersons were eligible for bank loans. Almost 70% of the country's population did not have access to loans, he told the first balloting ceremony of the Business Youth Loan Scheme at Islamabad's Convention Centre.

"It is the youth that will lead the nation by playing their role in strengthening the economy," Nawaz said adding that young entrepreneurs would not only be working in different sectors but would also help generate jobs for others.

Around 38,000 applications, including 28,000 from Punjab, 600 from Islamabad Capital Territory, 3,500 from Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa, 100 from Gilgit-Baltistan, 1,000 from Balochistan, 500 from Azad Kashmir and 3,000 from Sindh have been received under the youth loan programme, a statement released from the prime minister's office stated.

Out of the total 6,127 were approved for balloting, of which 5,399 would be given loans.

In his speech, Nawaz said that the applicants were selected on the basis of the provincial quota. Some 100,000 loans are to be offered every year.

Speaking on the country's economy, he maintained that the country's GDP showed a growth of five per cent during the first quarter of the current fiscal year, 17 per cent increase in taxes while the industrial growth was recorded 6.6 per cent until December 2013.

"Nothing was being done for the uplift of country in the past and that is why the people have been suffering due to long hours of load-shedding," Nawaz said. He added that resolving the energy crisis was the country's priority and since the government has assumed power, loadshedding hours have been cut down.

He said there was still a shortfall of 7,000 MW and the government would not only reduce this gap but would produce 20,000 to 25,000 MW of electricity.

The anti-polio drive is underway in certain constituencies of the provincial capitals of Sindh and Khyber Pakhtonkhwa amid high security. The drive is going on in 24 union councils of Karachi



covering areas of Gadap, Manghopir, Baldia, SITE, Orangi and Gulshan-e-Iqbal. Ban on motorbike riding is also in place in the aforementioned UCs. The anti-polio

drive will continued till 6pm. Similarly, a campaign titled, 'Sehat ka Insaaf' is also underway in Peshwar, with a ban on motorbike riding till 5pm. The vaccination of polio along with nine other diseases is being given to children in the KP's capital. It is the sixth phase of 'Sehat Ka Insaaf' campaign in Peshwar. Section 144 has already been imposed in the provincial capital. This is an example of how Pakistan faces crisis with bravery. Several national and international agencies attempted to put a stop to the anti-polio drive and to sabotage the progress yet, Pakistani's and the government were determined to ensure that those forces don't succeed in their diabolical schemes.

Mr Ali Hassan enlightened the students with the markets and sales department of a newspaper alongside giving them a new insight he also clearly explaining the 'need' for change in Dawn.

Avid Dawn readers were also invited to share their opinion on the change in Dawn. Mr Javaid Hassan an avid Dawn reader and a well known media personality came to share his view and delivered a heartfelt, interesting and humorous speech.

The children were informed of the history of Dawn. It was founded by Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah in Delhi, India on 26 October 1941 as a mouthpiece for the

Muslim League and the first issue was printed at Latifi Press on 12 October 1942. The newspaper has offices in Karachi (Sindh), Lahore (Punjab), and the federal capital Islamabad, as well as representatives abroad. As of 2004, it has a weekday circulation of over 138,000. The CEO of Dawn group is Hameed Haroon, and the current editor of Dawn is Zaffar Abbas. Dawn is Pakistan's oldest and most widely read English-language newspaper. One of the country's two largest English-language dailies, it is the flagship of the Dawn Group of Newspapers, published by Pakistan Herald Publications, which also owns the Herald, a magazine, the evening paper The Star and Spider, an information technology magazine.

The ceremony ended with senior journalist Abid Ali Syed distributing the shields to the speakers. All in all this was a very interesting and informative event that the students thoroughly enjoyed.

Durrani Associates has been exporting mangoes to Hong Kong, Singapore, Malaysia, China, Iran, Jordan and the UK. However, the HWT facility has helped it enter new markets of Lebanon, South Korea, Australia and Mauritius.

Pakistan is the sixth largest producer of mangoes with a total production capacity of around 1.8 million tons a year, Durrani said. However, he said, the country exports only 8% of its production while up to 30% is wasted due to multiple reasons ranging from primitive agricultural techniques to lack of processing and storage facilities on a large scale.

With advanced technology, the country can increase its exports by meeting international standards.

Though the country has tapped many new markets, this year's focus will be on China – one of the world's largest markets that opened up for Pakistani mangoes in 2012.

"Our current exports to China are almost nothing," he said. "China's demand is about 50,000 tons while we can export up to 20,000 tons."

However, he said the government can play an important role to help exporters achieve greater penetration in the market they just entered. "The government should mobilise its diplomatic missions in Beijing to help find more buyers," he said.

The government departments working for protection of women rights, legislation to provide women with a more secure working environment and some 101 NGOs working in the country to voice women issues have contributed towards creating opportunities for women to contribute towards the national objectives. The first International Women's Day was observed on February 28, 1909 in the United States, following a declaration by the Socialist Party of America. Among other relevant historic events, it came to commemorate the 1911 Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire.

The idea of having an international women's day was first put forward at the turn of the 20th century amid rapid industrialization and economic ex-



pansion that led to protests over working conditions.

The day is also commemorated at the United Nations level and is designated in many countries as a national holiday. When women from all the continents, with ethnic, linguistic, cultural, economic and political differences, come together to celebrate their Day, they can look back to a tradition that represents at least nine decades of struggle for equality, justice, peace and development.

International Women's Day Celebrations in Pakistan, too, have been gaining momentum for the past decade or so and we see a network of female activists and NGO's holding rallies, marches, seminars and other such activities on the day. The government too has been taking keen interest in the celebrations of the day and conducts ceremonies inviting the leading female professionals and experts to create awareness regarding the women issues.

The bank blames it on lack of investment; stagnant supply of domestic gas; persistent inefficiencies in energy-related public sector enterprises and inadequate infrastructure for gas import. "While all economic sectors have been affected by the energy shortages, the industrial sector has been the worst hurt," the SBP concedes and observes that due to technical differences in how the energy is used (fuel types) the impact on the local industry has varied across the sectors.

The bank recalls that when power and gas outages began in FY09, a number of industries suffered production declines, except those that run primarily on coal (such as cement industry).

However, as these outages persisted, firms in the LSM sector started exploring substitutes. The report says, "While power-intensive units like steel melting, edible oil/ghee and

textile spinning opted for generators that run on high speed diesel and/or furnace oil, gas intensive-units like paper, glass and chemicals shifted to boilers that can run on coal, waste heat and biomass."

The SBP report discusses response of different industries to energy shortages. In the textile sector, spinning and weaving of fibre are electricity-intensive, whereas dyeing and finishing are gas-intensive processes.

Most large spinning units are now run on back-up diesel generators, whereas in weaving sector a large number of units in Faisalabad, use power-looms for fabric manufacturing; some medium-sized power-looms have installed diesel generators.

A number of textile processing units have installed boilers that can run on bio-fuels like cotton waste, rice husk and other waste.

The steel sector comprises melting and re-rolling units. In the steel melting process, scrap is melted by using arc furnaces to form billets.

"This process is 100 per cent electricity-intensive and cannot be substituted by any other energy source," the SBP quarterly report said and noted that facing power shortages, smaller firms located in Punjab, switched to diesel-run generators, though it increased production costs and also reduced productivity as uninterrupted power supply is required to melt steel scrap.

The fertiliser sector has no alternative but to use natural gas as the principal raw material (feedstock) in production process, the bank stated and admitted that due to inadequate supply of gas, fertiliser production had declined in the previous two years and demand-supply gap had to be bridged with imports.

Afridi goes Boom Boom in win against Bangladesh

Pakistan defeated Bangladesh by three wickets to book their place in the final of the Asia Cup.

Bangladesh won the toss and elected to bat setting a record target of 327 for Pakistan. In response Pakistan got off to a steady start behind openers Ahmed Shahzad's century (103 off 112) and Muhammad Hafeez's 52 of 55 balls.

After Shahzad's dismissal the run rate increased and it seemed the match was no longer within the reach of Pakistan. Once again Shahid Afridi proved to be the difference maker. In a similar performance to that against India, Afridi went into 'Boom Boom' mode blasting 59 of 25 balls in an innings which included seven sixes.



Afridi opened the doors for a Pakistan win and it was Fawad Alam who ensured that there was no looking back. The left-hander hit 74 off 70 balls including a couple of late inning sixes.

Pakistan set a new record of achieving their highest chase when Umar Akmal hit the winning stroke.

Earlier, Bangladesh piled up a huge total of 326 runs for three wickets, which is their highest-ever total in an ODI innings.

Opener Anamul Haque made

100 off 132 balls with six boundaries and four sixes. This was his second century in One-day International cricket. This was also the second individual hundred by a Bangladeshi batsman in this tournament.

Among other batsmen, Imrul Kayes scored 59 from 75 balls with five fours and two sixes, Mominul Haque hit 51 off 47 balls with six fours, Mushfiqur Rahim smashed 51 off 33 balls with eight fours while Shakib Al Hasan playing for the first time in the tournament blasted an unbeaten 44 from just 16 balls with six fours and two sixes.

During the Bangladesh innings Pakistani spinner Abdur Rehman was stopped from bowling in the match when he delivered three consecutive above the wait no-balls in the 11th over.
