

## Ziarat Residency: Restoring the house that Mr Jinnah called home

"We have a tradition in our Pashtun culture," says Feroze, the manager of a guest house in Ziarat. "When there is a shaadi or a baby is born, we get out our guns. We're happy! We fire!" A little after 1 am on June 15, last year, Feroze woke to the sound of gunfire.

"I thought someone had their first baby boy because it was so intense," he said. A few minutes later, he learned that Ziarat Residency, Mohammad Ali Jinnah's home in his last few days in 1948, had been

attacked by militants.

The bomb disposal squad removed six more bombs planted inside the house, but not before furniture, artifacts and photographs inside were burned and one police official lost his life.



Within a month, architect Nayar Ali Dada was approached to oversee the Residency's restoration. While he has a record of such

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**Google adorns Pakistan's homepage with nationalistic doodle**

Today Pakistan celebrates its Independence Day and Google has contributed to our celebration by gracing Pakistan's Google homepage with a nationalistic doodle for Independence Day. The doodle depicts the Pakistan Monument, a blooming flower-shaped symbol of Pakistan.

Google puts a lot of thought into its Google doodles, producing between 300 and 400 doodles each year — around 50 of these tend to be moving or interactive. Google often plans what doodles it will embellish its homepage with months in advance and often illustrators take weeks to perfect the selected designs. The Pakistan Monument is one of Pakistan's most prominent monuments.

Before its construction, the Pakistan Council of Architects and Town Planners (PCATP) held a competition to find the



design which best represented Pakistan and its people and Arif Masood's design was ultimately selected.

The giant granite structure is comprised of petals resembling a blooming flower which is meant to be a symbol of Pakistan's blooming progress as a nation.

The four main petals represent the four provinces of Pakistan — Sindh, Punjab, Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the three smaller petals represent the three territories Azad Kashmir, Gilgit-Baltistan, and the Federally Administered Tribal Areas.

The inner walls of the petals are adorned with murals based on designs from Islamic architecture and structures.

**Barrel along: After a decade, Pakistan resumes crude oil export**

Pakistan has resumed export of crude oil after a gap of 10 years as output touched an all-time high of 98,000 barrels per day (bpd) in June 2014, an increase of 22% over the previous year, officials said.



Around 70,518 tons of ultra-light crude oil – known as condensate – has been exported in the last two months, according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). The export value is stated at \$60.7 million (Rs5.9 billion).

“At least one ship of 32,000-ton capacity is leaving the port every month,” said an industry official.

## Remittances rose to \$1.65bn in July

The first month of the new fiscal year saw over 17 per cent more remittances compared to the same period of last year, the State Bank reported.

The ever-increasing remittances are now the biggest support to the economy which helps to reduce the huge trade deficit and dilute the impact of the current account deficits.

The State Bank reported that the overseas Pakistanis sent \$1.649 billion in July which was 17.45 per cent higher than July 2014.

Pakistanis had sent \$15.83bn in FY-14 which not only helped the country continue to payback the debt to IMF but supported the exchange rate to gain strength against the US dollar.

Currency experts said if remittances kept growing with a rate of 17pc, the country could get more than \$18bn at



the end of the current fiscal year.

The inflow of remittances during July 2014 from Saudi Arabia, UAE, US, UK, GCC countries (including Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar and Oman) and EU countries amounted to \$454.47m, \$352.89m, \$257.08m, \$247.96m, \$179.76m and \$44.32m, respectively, compared with the inflow of \$410.73m, \$252.41m, \$233.06m, \$221.93m, \$161.44m and \$38.59m respectively in July 2013.

Remittances received from Norway, Switzerland, Australia, Canada, Japan and other countries during the last month amounted to \$112.91m as against \$86.23m received in the same month of the last fiscal year (FY14).

and India's Sherwin Rodrigues finished third. Beating Richards was special: Khatri

This was Khatri's best performance at any international tournament so far, and the 22-year-old believes that giving tough competition to World Champion Nigel Richards was his biggest achievement.

"I got to defeat Richards and that was a special moment," Khatri told "My target was to win six matches on the last day to finish among the top players.

"With Richards, I defeated him on day two, but he got back at me. He polarised me in our last match. He said I was better than him in the match and that is amazing, because Richards is a word machine."

Khatri said that Moiz's performance was also remarkable: "Moiz lost to the world

champion by three points. We did impress everyone here. Even nin-year-old Hasham Hadi grabbed everyone's attention with a world record spread of 878 points."

Meanwhile, Pakistan Scrabble Association Director Youth Tariq Pervez said: "It's an achievement for Khatri to finish fourth among world top players. It's special.

"We expect exports to rise because the output of condensate has gradually increased over the years."

The petroleum crude is coming from different fields in Sindh and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa. Three multinational firms, United Energy Pakistan, which took over the assets of BP in the country, OMV and MOL are mostly involved in the exports.

Pakistan State Oil (PSO) has allocated two 55,000 capacity tanks to two of the multinational companies for storing condensate before the shipments are made, said an official.

"These companies want to sign three-year contracts with PSO for using the tanks, indicating their long-term intention to keep the exports going."

Export of crude started after the discovery of the Badin Gas field along with the by-product condensate in the

1990s. The refineries initially didn't have the capability to process the condensate but when Attock and Pak Arab refineries started consuming most of the domestic supply, government restricted exports in 2004.

The average oil production in Pakistan jumped 13% to 86,000 bpd in fiscal year 2013-14 compared to the previous year. The oil output even reached an all-time high of 98,000 bpd by the end of June 2014.

Increase in oil output is coming in shape of condensate and other light crudes, which are hard to process in local hydro-skimming refineries, officials say.

Local light crude also gives a better yield of petroleum products as Attock Refinery, which relies on domestic supply, produces 20-22% of furnace oil against other refineries that have a furnace oil composition of 30-35%.

The prime minister said this project was part of the energy security plan of the government.

"We are glad that the operations agreement has been signed and all parties have showed their resolve to complete the project by target date (i.e. 2017)," he added.

Both sides also hoped to finalise export of 1000MW of Turkmen electricity to Pakistan at the earliest.

The prime minister said that Pakistan wanted to transform its ties with Turkmenistan into

strong economic partnership. "The focus of our foreign policy is on peace for development and the main thrust of our engagement with Central Asia is on trade, investment, energy, connectivity and culture," he added.

Meanwhile, addressing the Pakistan-Turkmenistan Joint Governmental Commission here on Thursday, Mr Sartaj Aziz said the government's policy was aimed at forging comprehensive, multifaceted relationships with Central Asian states, both on the bilateral and regional planes.

conservation projects, it was Dada's prior experience with the house that made him, as he puts it, a 'natural choice' – in the 1990s, the government recruited Dada to convert the Residency into a museum space after a fire.

Dada's handwritten notes from a visit to the Residency last year are telling – 'The house has been interfered with many times,' he wrote. "It was very sad," he explains. "The house had been painted red and white and it was used in a cold blooded way as a guesthouse." Additional kitchens were added, bathroom fittings ripped out and replaced. Rose pink tiles had been installed in Jinnah's bathroom, used as a guest bathroom. "The building had been mutilated," Dada says. Much of the furniture – including the Quaid's and Fatima Jinnah's beds – was in use, the wooden surfaces covered with carved out initials and messages.

It was only in May this year that the architects were able to begin work, ahead of an August 14th inauguration. "There was a great deal of in-

efficiency and bureaucracy," Dada says. "The work was done under a lot of pressure." He feels the work 'should have been done more carefully' and concedes, "The artifacts could have been created with a lot more accuracy, but we simply didn't have the time. We tried to catch that period, that ambience, and I think we've been 80 per cent successful."

The drive here from Quetta, said to take 1.5 hours, takes twice the time as the roads are potholed. Lavender and sunflowers grow along the curve of a crumbling road as you make your way to the Residency. Ahead of the PM's visit, two boys are busy paving the road that leads to the Residency. The chief minister's spokesperson Jan Mohammad Buledi says that the restoration will be accompanied by extensive road works in the area. "We have also made arrangements for strict security and FC personnel will oversee this," he says. "Now no one will be able to do any nuqsaaan to this house."

carrying female students.

The group had also threatened to kill owners and teachers of the schools if they defied their 'instructions' and continued to educate female students. The attacks and threats forced these institutions in the entire Panjgur district to close down.

Rallies condemning the unknown group and demanding arrest of the attackers were held in Panjgur, Quetta and other towns of Balochistan.

Two days ago, Chief Minister Dr Malik Baloch visited Panjgur and held meetings with the administration of private schools and concerned parents and assured them that all possible protection would be provided to the institutions and students and teachers associated with them.

On Wednesday, all private schools and language centres in the district reopened after heavy contingents of security forces were deployed there.

tively involved in promotion of women's football in the country.

"It started from home," Rubina tells Dawn. "The first three players who played for the club were my own daughters and slowly and gradually we started building upon that."

Hajra became the first woman footballer from the country to move abroad when she signed up for a short stint with Maldives' Sunrise Hotels and Resorts Women's FC in June this year.

Named one of five top players in the competition during her month-long stint, she believes her move has opened a window of opportunity for Pakistan's women's footballers.
