Pakistan observed a slight improvement in the overall international rankings in 2018 covering socio-economic and political outcomes of the country. Several elements complemented the prospects including successful democratic transition, efficient counter-terrorism measures leading to enhanced peace and security, and foreign direct investment inflows under CPEC, among others. Albeit, decoupling economic growth from human development suggests that the country needs to enhance its scores in health, education and standard of living by ensuring political will, equitable financing and efficient governance to ensure parallel growth for marginalized segments as well. Civil and political liberties must grow hand in hand to ensure a conducive environment for democratic dialogue and accountability which ultimately supports its nation building process.

DEMOCRACY INDEX

Pakistan ranked 112th out of 167 countries in the Democracy Index scoring 4.17 out of 10 in 2018 compared to 4.26 in 2017.

Index from 0 (authoritarian regime) to 10 (full democracy)

It listed Mufti Usmani's source of influence as scholarly and lineage.

"He is the leading scholar for the



Deobandis and in Islamic finance," according to the book and has authored 143 books in Arabic, English and Urdu.

The book also named Rashida Tlaib, a Palestinian-American congress-

woman, Woman of The Year. She is the first woman of Palestinian origin and one of the first Muslim women to be elected to the American Congress as a member of the House of Representatives.

Moody's upgrades Pakistan's outlook from 'under review for downgrade' to 'stable', maintains B3 rating

Moody's Investors Service (Moody's) has upgraded Pakistan's outlook from 'under review for downgrade' to 'stable', while maintaining a B3 rating. The stable outlook reflects Moody's view that the pressures Pakistan faces in the wake of the coronavirus shock and prospects for its credit metrics in general are likely to remain consistent with the current rating level.

Moody's expects Pakistan's economic growth to be positive in fiscal 2021 (ending June 2021) from a recession in fiscal 2020, but still low at around 1 to 2 per cent. While Pakistan's economy is relatively closed with low reliance on exports, movement restrictions due to coronavirus will keep economic activity below the pre-outbreak levels for some time.

The Federal Finance Ministry announced this development in a tweet and said, "This is an affirmation of the Government's sound fiscal and financial policies in these times of unprecedented hardship and uncertainty."

Moody's Investors Service ("Moody's") has confirmed that the government of Pakistan's B3 local and foreign currency issuer and senior unsecured debt ratings with a stable outlook. Concurrently, Moody's has also confirmed the B3 foreign currency senior unsecured ratings for The Third Pakistan International Sukuk Co Ltd. The associated payment obligations are,



in Moody's view, direct obligations of the government. This concludes the review for downgrade initiated on 14 May 2020.

Rationale for the stable outlook "The coronavirus pandemic is weighing on economic activity in Pakistan, resulting in lower tax revenue, a wider fiscal deficit, and a higher debt burden for the government. While continued spread of the virus poses downside risks to the economy and government finances, financial and technical support from development partners mitigates external vulnerability and liquidity risks," Moody's said in a statement issued.

"The government's commitment to

its current International Monetary Fund (IMF) Extended Fund Facility (EFF) continues to unlock a large financial envelope that Moody's expects will cover its external financing needs over the next 12-18 months, and provides an anchor for ongoing fiscal reforms. Effective macroeconomic policies lower interest payments, supporting debt affordability, and provide policy buffers."

The slow economic recovery will in turn weigh on government revenue, keeping the fiscal deficit wide at around 8 to 8.5 per cent of GDP in fiscal 2021 under Moody's projections, at similar levels compared to fiscal year 2020, and leaving the government's debt burden at around 90

per cent of GDP by the end of fiscal year 2021. Risks to the economy and government finances are to the downside, particularly if more stringent measures are implemented to curb the spread of the virus domestically," Moody's maintain.

Moody's also expects the government's ongoing engagement with development partners on fiscal reforms, such as through the IMF EFF and other programmes with the Asian Development Bank and World Bank, to contribute to a modest widening of the revenue base, once the crisis passes, improving debt affordability and containing fiscal risks over the next few years.

Pakistan-born astrophysicist Nergis Mavalvala named dean of MIT School of Science

Pakistan-born quantum astrophysicist Nergis Mavalvala has been named the new dean of the MIT School of Science, one of the five schools of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT).


According to MIT News, she will become the new dean from September 1 and will succeed Michael Sipser, who will return to the faculty as the Donner Professor of Mathematics after six years of service.

Mavalvala is renowned for her pioneering work in gravitational-wave detection, which she conducted as a leading member of the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory (LIGO), the report said.

"She has received numerous awards and honours for her research and teaching, and since 2015 has been the associate head of the Department of Physics. Mavalvala will be the first woman to serve as dean in the School of Science."

It added that Mavalvala was "energised and optimistic" about the role ahead, even as she acknowledged the unprecedented challenges the school and the institute as a whole were facing during this difficult time.

"We're in this moment where enor-



mous changes are afoot," she said. "We're in the middle of a global pandemic and economic challenge, and we're also in a moment, at least in US history, where the imperative for racial and social justice is really strong.

Meanwhile, MIT President L. Rafael Reif stated that Mavalvala's "brilliance as a researcher and educator speaks eloquently for itself".

"What excites me equally about her appointment as dean are the qualities I have seen in her as a leader: She is a deft, collaborative problemsolver, a wise and generous colleague, an incomparable mentor, and a champion for inclusive excellence.

"As we prepare for the start of this

most unusual academic year, it gives me great comfort to know that the School of Science will remain in such capable hands."

The report added that the news was announced by Provost Martin Schmidt via a letter emailed to the MIT community in which he said:

"I hope you will join me in congratulating her as she brings her great gifts as a leader to this new role."

Born to a Parsi family in Karachi, Mavalvala received her early education from the Convent of Jesus and Mary school, an administration official from the educational institute had confirmed. She later moved to the United States as a teenager to attend Wellesley College in Massachusetts, where she is said to have a natural gift for being comfortable in her own skin, according to an article published on the sciencemag.org website.

Mavalvala did her BA at Wellesley College in Physics and Astronomy in 1990 and a PhD in physics in 1997 from MIT.

Before that, she was a postdoctoral associate and then a research scientist at the California Institute of Technology (Caltech), working with LIGO.

She also received the prestigious MacArthur Foundation Award in 2010. Later in 2016, Mavalvala was part of a team of scientists credited with the discovery of gravitational waves, a new window for studying the cosmos.

"We are really witnessing the opening of a new tool for doing astronomy," Mavalvala had said in an interview at the time. "We have turned on a new sense. We have been able to see and now we will be able to hear as well."

PIA to partially resume flights to UK

The Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) will partially resume its flights to the United Kingdom from August 14 with a hired plane.

PIA spokesman Abdullah Hafeez said that an agreement had been signe between Portugal's airline and the national carrier.

He said the PIA would operate flights with an Airbus A330, having a seating capacity of more than 300 passengers.

"The PIA has hired a plane and crew from a European company to operate flights using PIA call sign and slots," he said, adding:

"Due to public demand, the national flag carrier is resuming its flights."



The plane would have economy and business classes with comfortable seating capacity, he said.

Aircraft hired from European company. Mr Hafeez said that passengers would be able to travel to London, Manchester and Birmingham from Pakistan under the new arrangement.

He said that social distancing would be strictly observed in all the flights.

The spokesman said a PIA flight, PK-9702, would depart for Islamabad from Manchester with 250 passengers on August 14.

On August 15, PIA flight PK-9785 will depart from Islamabad for London.

He said that booking of seats had been started and all seats had been booked for the first flight.

The spokesman said that the airline would facilitate passengers with 45kg of baggage per passenger on the flights.

He said that after the suspension of PIA flights to the UK, other airlines had increased fares and it was expected that after the resumption of PIA flights, fares of other airlines would also come down.

Hajj goes virtual for families of lucky pilgrims

Faridah Bakti Yahra travelled alone to Mecca when she won the lottery of a lifetime to join this year's Hajj, the smallest in living memory, but her family is relishing the experience virtually.

Thanks to her smartphone, and the 5G towers that loom over the holy city, the Indonesian housewife is sharing every step of the pilgrimage with her husband and three daughters back home in the Saudi coastal city of Khobar.

"I am so happy he joined me virtually, spiritually, with my daughters also. May my dear husband come here together with me again for Hajj inshallah (God willing)," the 39 year old told AFP.

In the first days of the pilgrimage, many of the faithful were seen holding their phones aloft to snap selfies and livestream their progress to friends and family back home.

Super high-speed 5G technology was rolled out in Mecca last year, allowing pilgrims to transfer data at breakneck speeds, and the network is now prevalent across much of Saudi Arabia.

But this year the shared religious experience has even greater resonance, with the gathering scaled down from more than two million people to just a few thousand, and at a time when many prayers are being offered for a world gripped by the novel coronavirus pandemic.

Yahra opened a video call on the first day of the Hajj at Mecca's Grand Mosque when she approached the Kaaba, a large cubic structure draped in gold embroidered black cloth, towards which Muslims around the world pray.

"When my wife entered the Kaaba area and she showed me the Kaaba, I felt very, very cheerful, joyful, with tears," her husband Hendra Samosir said.

"It was very truly a holy journey I would say, even though I wasn't there, but looking at my wife attending this Hajj, it feels like I was there."



Hundreds of thousands of Indonesians usually take part in the Hajj, many waiting and saving for years before their turn comes up.

This year, there are believed to be hardly more than a dozen in Mecca.

Yahra was selected in a process that for the first time excluded pilgrims from outside the kingdom.

Muslims worldwide were disappointed, even though most accepted that a Hajj on the usual scale was out of the question.

Foreign residents make up 70 percent of the group and Saudi citizens make up the remainder, drawn from medical professionals and security personnel who have recovered from the virus.

There were grumbles over what was seen as an opaque system, and those who missed out swamped the Hajj ministry's Twitter account with anguished queries.

But for Samosir, who opted to stay at home and look after the couple's children, his wife's selection was "very good news" after months of bad news due to the novel coronavirus pandemic.

The virus crisis triggered months of lockdown in Saudi Arabia and a slump that saw the 44-year-old lose his job in the oil industry.

But he said the virtual pilgrimage left him feeling "like an empty bowl filled up with water".

In recent years, the Hajj has been at the centre of an acceleration in the growth of digital worship, with a slew of religious apps and tablet Korans. Some pilgrims now prefer reading Quranic verses from their smartphones rapidly replacing traditional printed holy books.

But the tech is not limited to reading on screens and sharing stories. It has rapidly evolved to offer pilgrims the possibility of performing religious duties from their homes.

Online platforms have emerged allowing worshippers to virtually perform the year-round umrah, or minor pilgrimage, which usually takes only a few hours.

The service is based on the concept of outsourcing the pilgrimage asking someone in Saudi Arabia to perform umrah on their behalf, and experiencing it through a live virtual reality tool.

Some Islamic clerics support the idea, while others say only the sick are entitled to such an option.

And the situation is different with the Hajj, a journey made over several days that requires walking for kilometres, praying for hours, and sleeping outdoors.

Some of this year's pilgrims have reported that performing the pilgrimage on such a small scale has been an intensely spiritual experience

"I am praying for my husband to get back to work again," Yahra said.

"And I pray for the situation to get back to normal again, for the pandemic to stop, and for coronavirus to be gone."

Pakistan to resume international flight operations



Pakistan has decided to resume all international flights from August 9 midnight, said an official document issued by the country's Civil Aviation Authority.

The country already restored domestic flights at all airports, with a few exceptions, reflecting its intent to return to the pre-coronavirus aviation operations.

In March, Pakistan decided to close domestic and international flights and discourage large gatherings to try to halt the spread of the coronavirus.

"Government of Pakistan is pleased to allow all types of international passenger operations to/from all airports as available pre-COVID-19.

"International scheduled flight operations to/from Pakistan will revert to authorizations as per Summer-20 scheduling season," it added. "However, international flight operations shall be conducted in accordance with established guidelines and applicable SOPs. International cargo and special flight operations may also be conducted to/from Pakistan as per applicable SOPs."

Planning Minister Asad Umar announced that virtually all sectors in Pakistan shut down to prevent the spread of the coronavirus would be reopened next week.

With infections and deaths down nearly 80 percent since their peak as per government records, the National Coordination Committee (NCC), the apex body set up to oversee coronavirus mitigation efforts, met on Thursday to decide on measures to help the country return to normalcy. Umar announced that tourist destinations would open from August 8, restaurants, theaters and beauty salons from August 10 and schools and marriage halls from September 15. Shops would go back to pre-coronavirus timings from August 10.


He has already been contacted by the Pakistan Athletics Federation to train with leading coaches in the country and now reports state that Pakistan Army has also recruited the talented athlete.

Karachi Cantonment Board Clifton janitorial staff salaries increased to Rs17,500

The contractual janitorial staff of Karachi Cantonment Board Clifton have got their salaries raised to Rs17,500 a month the minimum wage fixed by the government.

They were until now getting Rs12,200 a month. The raise of Rs5,300 will be effective from the month of July.

However, the matter of salaries of these cantonment board employees is still sub judice in the Sindh High Court.

There are around 4,500 janitorial staff in the Cantonment Board Clifton and around 2,000 of them are working on contractual basis.

There are six cantonment boards in Karachi, including the Cantonment Board Clifton, Cantonment Board Malir, Cantonment Board Korangi, Cantonment Board Faisal, Karachi Cantonment Board and Cantonment Board Manora.

Around 20,000 janitorial workers are working in all six cantonment boards in the city. Of them, 8,000 are working on contractual basis.

The other five cantonment boards have not yet increased salaries of their contractual janitorial staff to the minimum wage.



Enhancing Pakistan's counter-narcotics capacity through provision of specialized equipment under funding by the Government of Japan

In a high-level ceremony organized at the Headquarters Anti Narcotics Force (ANF), UNODC Country Office Pakistan, in collaboration with the Embassy of Japan, handed over specialized equipment to the ANF, Pakistan's premier counternarcotics law enforcement agency. H.E. Mr. Azam Khan Swati, Federal Minister of Narcotics-Control and H.E. Mr. Kuninori Matsuda, the Ambassador of Japan to Pakistan were also present at the occasion.

The equipment has been provided under a Japan-funded project being implemented by UNODC Country Office Pakistan (COPAK) entitled 'Strengthening border security against illicit drug trafficking and related transnational organized crime (2016-2020). It comprised IT equipment for automating Pakistan's National Precursors Management System (NPMS), and for consolidating interagency networking under the framework of national Inter Agency Task Force (IATF) on Counter-Narcotics, formulated by the Government of Pakistan in February 2010. Twenty Narcotics-Sniffer Dogs and forty Bullet Proof Vests and Helmets were also handed over, to strengthen ANF's drug interdiction capacity in border areas, dry ports, airports and seaports.

While welcoming the delegates, Mr. Ali Zulnoorain Sheikh, PSP, Deputy Director General ANF thanked the Federal Minister of Narcotics Control and the Ambassador of Japan for gracing the auspicious occasion. He offered gratitude to Mr. Jeremy Milsom, Representative and other senior officials from UNODC COPAK for providing regular technical support to the ANF and other members of Pakistan's IATF on counter narcotics. He said, "The ANF highly appreciates continuing capacitybuilding measures by UNODC, our closest strategic partner in the UN family. The ANF continues to lead counter-narcotics efforts not only in Pakistan, but we have also contributed to several international interdiction operations, where various international partners have greatly benefitted from timely and



accurate information provided by the ANF. We are making concerted efforts to nab drug traffickers, as they continue to exploit Pakistan's geographical location next to Afghanistan and the shortest distance it provides to the international maritime routes".

In his remarks, Mr. Jeremy Milsom thanked the Federal Minister of Narcotics Control and the Ambassador of Japan for their presence at the gracious handover ceremony. He also offered gratitude to the Government of Japan for its great commitment to support the ANF and other law enforcement agencies in Pakistan and that Japan's steady funding support to UNODC for capacity building of national counterparts has always been pre eminent. "It is indeed a great feeling and privilege to support a highly professional and competent force like the ANF, in its continuing efforts to save the world from drug trafficking and drug abuse the greatest challenges of our times. UNODC well-recognizes ANF's whole-hearted counter-narcotics operations efforts, whereby the ANF personnel even laid down their precious lives while fighting drug traffickers in various parts of the country. We acknowledge ANF's leading counter narcotics role and it will always remain our main partner in Pakistan. We also believe that multi dimensional roles and cross-cutting mandates

of various national stakeholders can be used as a force-multiplier, to address risks and challenges of drug trafficking in Pakistan" said Mr. Milsom.

After his remarks, Mr. Saqib Khan Programme Officer (Border Management) of UNODC COPAK highlighted the specificity, advantages and expected results associated with the equipment.

In his statement, H.E. Mr. Kuninori Matsuda appreciated highly technical and sustainable capacity-building support by UNODC COPAK and also realized the need to continue its funding contributions, to rid Pakistan of the menace of drug trafficking and associated money laundering, that continue to threaten health, human security and socio-economic development in Pakistan. He assured that the Government of Japan continues to accord a high-priority to the peace-security-development nexus and therefore, will continue endeavors to build Pakistan's counter narcotics capacity. He also offered condolences on the recent sacrifices made by ANF personnel in the line of duty, whereby four ANF personnel were martyred during two major encounters with the drug trafficking networks in Balochistan and Rawalpindi.

In his closing remarks, Mr. Azam Khan Swati, the Federal Minister of

Narcotics-Control highlighted the emerging misuse of the internet for drug peddling and money laundering, a predicate crime under the FATF, and a growing challenge for the rule of law and socio-economic development. He also highly appreciated regular and sustainable capacity-building support by the Government of Japan as Pakistan's long-term strategic partner through UNODC. "The Government of Pakistan well-recognizes that controlling licit use of precursor chemicals is an important countermeasure to prevent drug production. The Precursor Management System being strengthened under this project is a cost-effective way to combat drug production and trafficking from Afghanistan" said Mr. Swati. He also highlighted the vision of Prime Minister Imran khan to address the growing challenge of narcotics trafficking, by adopting a collective, coherent and multilateral approach, He reiterated that Pakistan, as a law-abiding country is not going to tolerate the menace of drug trafficking and its negative consequences upon health and socio-economic development in Pakistan. He also drew attention to Government of Pakistan's recent counter narcotics drive, as well as measures for strengthening the national legislation and interagency partnerships, as per special directive of Prime Minister Imran Khan.

Apple and Google pull Fortnite from mobile app shops

Apple and Google on Thursday pulled video game sensation Fortnite from their mobile app shops after its maker Epic Games released an update that dodges revenue sharing with the tech giants.

The latest version of Fortnite contains a payment system that lets player transactions bypass Apple's App Store and Google's Play, preventing the firms from collecting their typical 30 percent cut.

Apple, which does not allow users of its popular devices to download apps from anywhere but its App Store, booted the game from its online marketplace, followed later Thursday by Google.

Epic quickly filed a federal lawsuit against Apple, accusing the iPhone maker of wielding monopoly power.

The game-maker called on a federal judge to order Apple to stop its "anti-competitive conduct" and invalidate the tech giant's rules requiring app developers to pay the company 30 percent of transactions.

The suit said Epic is not seeking favourable treatment, but is asking the court to order Apple to change its commission structure for all developers.

Apple said Fortnite was pulled after "Epic Games took the unfortunate step of violating the App Store guidelines that are applied equally to every developer and designed to keep the store safe for our users."

Google followed suit and removed Fortnite from its Play store for mobile devices powered by its Android software.



"For game developers who choose to use the Play Store, we have consistent policies that are fair to developers and keep the store safe for users," Google said in reply to an AFP inquiry.

Gamers will still be able to play Fortnite on their mobile devices, though Apple users will no longer be able to receive updates because those would need to come through the App Store.

Android users can still download updates directly from Epic.

Apple has in recent months come under fire for the tight grip it has on the App Store, with the issue coming up during a heated congressional antitrust hearing last month.

"Apple has become what it once railed against: the behemoth seeking to control markets, block competition, and stifle innovation," the lawsuit argued. "Apple is bigger, more powerful, more entrenched, and more pernicious than the monopolists of yesteryear."

The Silicon Valley colossus has defended its position, saying its commission which can drop to 15 percent in the second year for subscriptions helps it keep apps and users safe from hackers and scammers.

"Epic agreed to the App Store terms and guidelines freely and we're glad they've built such a successful business on the App Store," Apple said.

"The fact that their business interests now lead them to push for a special arrangement does not change the fact that these guidelines create a level playing field for all developers and make the store safe for all users."

Fortnite has been played by some 350 million people around the

world since its release in 2017. Set in a virtual world, players must survive by searching for weapons and resources while eliminating competitors.

It is also a popular esports title in which spectators watch expert players compete, in some cases for cash prizes.

Epic is taking a "risky and calculated path" by going after Apple at a time that the App Store is under scrutiny by antitrust regulators, reasoned Wedbush analyst Dan Ives.

"This is a high stakes game of poker being played," Ives said.

"Apple needs to make sure the Epic challenge, which is timely in light of anti-trust swirls and growing opposition to Big Tech within the Beltway, does not create a ripple impact which developers globally are watching carefully," Ives said.

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
